What you need to use this breakout:

- Chromebooks, computers, laptops or some type of mobile device. You will need one device for each team. I recommend teams of 2-3 students if possible. The devices must be connected to the internet.
- Scratch paper for students to write down the lock codes while they are working.

Students DO NOT need a Google login or account to complete this breakout. Students will go to the Google Form and proceed through the activities and questions. There is one activity that students will have to complete on an external website. The website is from h5p.org. There is a link to the site in the form. Once the activity is completed, students will write down the secret code word so they can enter it into the form.

This is not an editable form. You will not be able to change or delete any of the content. This is different than a Google Forms quiz. Students MUST enter the correct answer before advancing to the next question or section.

Anchor/Apathy

¹Anchor: [ang-kur] *noun*
A heavy metal object lowered from a boat when it stops moving to keep it from drifting

²Anchor: [ang-kur] *verb*
To keep a boat in place by dropping an anchor

³Anchor: [ang-kur] *noun*
The main person on camera during a TV news show.

Angry [ang-gre] *adjective*
Feeling or showing annoyance or bad feelings toward someone or something.

Annihilate [un-nye-ul-late] *verb*
To destroy something completely.

Annoy: [uh-noi] *verb*
To make someone lose patience or feel angry.

To say or write something in reply

²Answer: [an-sur] *noun*
The solution to a problem.

Apathetic: [ap-uh-thet-ik] *adjective*
Not having or showing much interest in something.
